Subject Story: Forest Schoo

In our Forest School curriculum you will see our value of **Friendship.**

- Children work closely with their peers to achieve common goals helping them to develop and strengthen their friendships and to learn and apply social skills like negotiation, conflict, resolution and diplomacy
- The promotion of social skills through group games and activities will enable children to better communicate with others and develop positive friendships and relationships

In our Forest School curriculum you will see our value of **Responsibility**.

- Children are responsible for using 'real' tools safely
- Children learn about fire safety when around the fire circle
- Children are responsible for looking after their Forest School environment
- Children are aware of the Forest School rules and how to apply them

In our Forest School curriculum you will see our value of **Honesty.**

- Children are given the freedom to make decisions about their own learning which empowers them.
- Children know that it is ok to make mistakes
- Children are given time to reflect on their learning
- Adults model honest and positive attitudes

In our Forest School curriculum you will see our value of **Love**.

- Love for the environment
- Empathy for living creatures
- Care for their surroundings
- Children experience the seasons and wonders of nature

In our Forest School curriculum you will see our value of **Courage**.

- Children achieve and develop confidence and self-esteem through hands-on learning experiences
- Children are encouraged to take managed risks to become more resilient learners
- Children will be encouraged to challenge themselves during activities to broaden their knowledge and skills

In our Forest School curriculum you will see our value of **Respect**.

- Forest School enables children to be more respectful of the environment and living things
- Children demonstrate respect when listening to their peers during class reflection

- We use a range of learner-centred processes to create a community for development and learning

- Children demonstrate resilience by adopting a 'can do' attitude when using tools to make objects
- Children are challenged to try new activities

In our Forest School curriculum you will see our school curriculum vision because our children dream big - aspire.

 Forest School supports the development of life long skills such as self-belief, self-esteem, self-regulation, empathy & social skills which are essential skills for a child's future In our Forest School curriculum you will see that we value **inclusion and diversity.**

- Activities are diverse and accessible to all children
- We use different materials and food to celebrate each child's individual cultural background and beliefs



In our Forest School curriculum you will see how we develop our children's language, **including subject specific and technical vocabulary.**

- The sensory experiences that Forest School provides helps prompt language development
- Specific vocabulary taught within Forest School can be found within our 'knowledge and skills progression' documents which links to the Early Years & National curriculum

British Values and Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural Learning (SMSC) in Forest School:

- **Spiritual**: The power of Forest School makes it valuable in overcoming problems, working together and creating a sense of awe and wonder.
- Moral: Children experience the relationship between their actions and the natural world
- Social: Children develop their sense of identity and belonging. Activities engaged with in an outdoor environment often help to develop communication, co-operation, compassion and emphasise the importance of certain rules and boundaries
- **Cultural**: Forest School allows children to develop values and opinions that are informed by first-hand experiences of the natural world. This helps them to appreciate the natural world and have an experience of flora and fauna which they might not usually encounter

Children achieve well in this subject. Highlights of **outcomes** in Forest School for last academic year are:

- Motivation: High levels of interest lead to high levels of attention and participation
- Physical Skills: Development of fine and gross motor skills, stamina and co-ordination through active learning
- Confidence: Increased self-confidence and selfesteem due to freedom, time and space. Children demonstrate independence. Children make decisions and evaluate risk.
